
Then and Now

The Devon Horse Show and Country Fair

Following its relatively simple origins in bucolic surroundings, the entity that we now know as the Devon Horse Show and Country Fair, and the complex it inhabits, has expanded and evolved significantly over the years, and the adjacent area has also seen some notable changes.

One of the most memorable landmarks in the area may no longer be seen except in historic photographs. The majestic Devon Inn stood opposite the Devon train station at the other end of tree-lined Devon Boulevard. It was a grand summer resort destination for many years, and the first Devon Horse Show was held on its lawns in 1896. Tragically, it was lost to fire in 1929 fire and was not rebuilt. Closer to the station, opposite Dorset Road, there was also an imposing two-story stables building that housed horses and carriages for the Inn, as well as employees. That structure is also no longer standing.

The family-owned Waterloo Gardens complex, later built along the same Devon Boulevard, is another long-standing landmark that will soon be only memory. Started by James and Anna Paolini in 1942, the business prospered until economic setbacks began in 2007 and the business finally closed in 2013. The property has been sold and preliminary plans are in development for a mixed-use commercial complex that may feature a new boutique hotel bringing back the Devon Inn name.


