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Other Materials

2016 was an especially rich year for donations. Another addition to the collection relates to Camp Fuller. This was a World War I United States Marine Corps signal training camp in western Tredyffrin Township, located on the property now occupied by the Vanguard Corporation. The view of the camp was a gift in 2013, one of the illustrations in the book-length history of the Marines donated by Charles P. Stone.³

The view of the camp tents will now be joined by four pictures of men at Camp Fuller. They are a gift from Jim Brazel who bought them on the online auction service eBay. The photographs are all dated August 2, 1918, and show what seems to be the same two men engaged in some kind of construction or carpentry. In one of these, you can see the words "Camp Edw[ard]. C. Fuller" created out of



white painted rocks on the slope. There is a third shot of the same two men standing in uniform on a road. We can only wish that at least one would have shown the men in actual signal corps training.

A second gift from Jim Brazel, also purchased on eBay, is a packet of 25 souvenir photographs of Valley Forge. This tiny item measures just 1 5/8 x 2 3/4 inches. The back of the box is imprinted with the words "Published by [the] Washington Inn, Valley Forge, PA," and was probably for sale at the Inn and perhaps at other shops in the Valley Forge area. The Washington Inn, a building in Valley Forge Park near Washington's Headquarters at the intersection of Valley Creek Road (Rte. 252) and Valley Forge Road (Rte. 23), had been converted in the 1850s to an inn, with fancy Victorian-style gingerbread and a prominent cupola. For about 75 years it was a very popular destination. About 1950, the Park Service began removing non-original additions to 18th-century buildings in the park. With little evidence remaining as to what the building looked like in 1778, the former Washington Inn was restored to look more like a Federal or early 19th-century structure, and named the David Potts House, after the man who was thought to be the property owner in the Federal Period.

Three photographs of the Mazie Hall House on Mt. Pleasant Avenue in Wayne were the gift of Gretchen Kiernan, who photographed the house in 2006. These pictures are significant because Mazie Hall was an icon of courage in Tredyffrin for most of her 103 years. She spent most of her teaching career commuting to Camden to teach in all-black schools there.

But earlier, in 1932, eight years after graduating from West Chester Normal School (now West Chester University), Mazie Hall unfortunately alienated friends and colleagues in the black community of the upper Main Line by agreeing to become the principal of the segregated all-black school in her Mt. Pleasant area, after the Tredyffrin/Easttown (TE) School District had controversially decided to segregate its schools, and a huge civic uproar ensued.⁴ Although by 1934 the segregation decision had been reversed, the schools were again integrated, and despite her best intentions to ensure that the affected children would get a good education, sadly Mazie Hall had lost her job and many friends.

In 1962, after nearly thirty years of teaching in Camden, Mazie retired. She remained active in the community of Mt. Pleasant until almost the end of her life, mentoring scores of young people, teaching them in her dining room, and later in the community center. In 1993, she donated her large collection of African-American history books, pamphlets, and other papers to Eastern College.⁵ She is now remembered, in part, by a Tredyffrin Township community park named in her honor, and located in her beloved Mt. Pleasant neighborhood.

Charles P. Stone donated three color postcards of facilities at the Upper Main Line YMCA (UMLY), dating from the late 1960s. Two show children frolicking in the pool, and one depicts the tennis courts. The building in the background, known as Kelso, still survives on the UMLY property, having once been the country home of Gardner Cassatt, the younger brother of Alexander Cassatt who owned Chesterbrook Farm.

Artifacts

In the category of artifacts, the TEHS received several fascinating items. Two caps, from the Devon American Legion Post and the Devon-Strafford Lions Club, were donated by Dominic DeVitis, in memory of his father Nunzio DeVitis. Also received was a grass seed bag from Berwyn Hardware, ca. 1950; and five 35mm slides of scenes in Valley Forge Park, taken in 1962—gifts of Larry and Joyce DeYoung.

A pint-milk bottle from the Warner Dairy in Berwyn was a gift of Charles P. Stone. The Warner Dairy operated from 1914 to 1955, and in a nice coincidence, the location of their large dairy production facility, built in 1926, was the site of the Mack Oil Company today, so it would have been the next business on that site after William Burns' Berwyn Planing Mill and before Mack Oil. The business was formed by combining several smaller dairies, some of which had operated as early as the 1880s. The Society also received two quart-milk bottles, from Chesterbrook Farm and Crumdale Farm, a gift from Edith Blair Perry in memory of her mother, Janet Perry, who was a TEHS member for many years.⁶

Ms. Perry also donated a carpenter's apron from Fritz Lumber, a particularly appropriate gift given that 2016 was the year Fritz Lumber closed after 153 years in operation. Through the efforts of Roger Thorne, we also have some fifty scans of various Fritz Lumber letterhead paper, correspondence, and invoices.
