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From the Editors

In August 2019, the Society's Special Member Excursion to the American Swedish Historical Museum in Philadelphia was a wonderful opportunity to learn more about many less well-known aspects of Swedish history in early America. A report on that visit is included in this issue. Before our guided tour of the museum, we were introduced to historian Larry Ward, whose illustrated presentation included background information that helped to provide context for exploring the museum. We are pleased to publish his article about the "plantation" in early colonial Pennsylvania. The image on the cover depicts a related scene from English colonial history, while those on the back cover, and these first pages, provide some Swedish historical and cultural perspective.

Following up on previous articles and research about the Revolutionary War soldiers believed to have been buried in the cemetery at St. Peter's in the Great Valley, and the "Commemoration for the Fallen" ceremonies held there in 2007 and 2014, Roger Thorne's article reports on the scientific studies done on site in summer 2019, using ground-penetrating radar and other high-technology tools, in an attempt to answer some of the questions that remain.

In the aftermath of the very sad loss of our dear friend Herb Fry in August 2018, we were very pleased to receive a large collection of historical materials from his family. Society Archivist Cheryl Leibold's article describes many of the items included in this important and generous gift, as well as a few other interesting items.

Society Board Chairman Larry DeYoung generously volunteered to restore an artifact that dates back to the founding days of the Society's predecessor, the History Club, and his article provides some background on this worthy project and its subject.



The Dala Horse — a popular symbol of Sweden - is a traditional carved, painted wooden statue of a horse originating in the Swedish province of Dalarna (or Dalecarlia). In simpler times, a horse was a highly valued asset and companion in many Swedish households, and was considered to be a status symbol. The carved and painted wooden horses were often used as toys for children, but in modern times have become a symbol of Dalarna, as well as of Sweden in general. While quite varied in appearance, with distinguishing features reflecting the locality where they are produced, the most common style features a stoutly carved horse painted bright red with ornate details and a harness in white, green, yellow, and blue.
